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1. VHHA in Action

Each day, VHHA actively works on behalf of its members, their employees, and Virginians to advance the interests of Virginia's hospitals and health care systems. In the past week, here are some developments of interest to Virginia hospitals and health systems:

- VHHA held a weekly legislative briefing call for its Board of Directors and convened a meeting of the Virginia Hospital & Healthcare Advocacy Committee (VHHAC) for discussions about pending legislation, policy, and budgetary issues before the Virginia General Assembly.
- VHHA Solutions is the new name for VHHA Shared Services, a longstanding division of VHHA. This rebranding reflects the evolution of an organization that delivers operational solutions to support health care facilities and providers in achieving performance excellence while serving patients. That work is accomplished through relationships VHHA Solutions cultivates with vetted and endorsed vendor partners such as Qualivis, a leader in sustainable workforce solutions tailored for hospitals and health care providers to address staffing challenges, and Vizient, which specializes in a range of health care focused solutions including supply chain, pharmacy, growth, operations, care delivery excellence, and more. - The fourth annual Insights Into Autism conference is being held today (Friday, Feb. 2) from 8
 a.m.-4 p.m. at Eastern Virginia Medical School (EVMS). The event is presented by Children's
 Hospital of The King's Daughters (CHKD) and EVMS in collaboration with the Autism Society of

Tidewater Virginia and **Southeastem Cooperative Educational Programs** (SECEP). The program provides attendees with resources for advocacy and a better understanding of neurodiversity from many perspectives including augmentative communication, improving and providing ideas for autism care, transitioning to adulthood, adaptability, and camouflaging for females and highly functional people with autism. It is intended for providers and stakeholders including pediatricians, neurologists, psychiatrists, nurses, occupational therapists, speech therapists, art therapists, special education teachers, social workers, other interested allied health professionals, and anyone who wishes to improve care to patients and families diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder. - Virginia birthing hospitals can contact <u>VFC@vdh.virginia.gov</u> to discuss enrollment in the Vaccines for Children (VFC) program, which provides RSV vaccines to facilities at no cost.
 Enrollment in the VFC program is an important step to ensuring access to RSV immunization for children with Medicaid or no insurance coverage born at Virginia hospitals.
- The **Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services** (CMS) recently finalized <u>regulations</u> designed to streamline the health plan prior authorization process, promote greater transparency into medical necessity criteria, and improve the electronic exchange of health care information. The requirements apply to Medicare Advantage plans, state Medicaid fee-for-service (FFS) programs, Medicaid managed care plans, state Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) FFS programs, CHIP managed care entities, and qualified health plan issuers on the federally facilitated exchange. The rule requires impacted payers to implement and maintain several Fast Healthcare Interoperability Resources (FHIR)-based application programming interfaces (APIs) to improve the electronic exchange of data.
- The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and the U.S. Departments of Labor and Treasury recently reopened the public comment period for a proposed rule to improve the No Surprises Act independent dispute resolution process. The public comment period is available for 14 days beginning Jan. 22 to provide feedback. The comment deadline is Feb. 5. Read more here and here and submit comments through this link.
- Virginia Health Information (VHI) has published an <u>interactive data dashboard</u> on health insurance costs and transparency. The dashboard is the result of <u>legislation</u> approved by the Virginia General Assembly in 2022 that requires the Virginia Department of Health (VDH), in consultation with the Virginia State Corporation Commission's (SCC) Bureau of Insurance (BOI), to establish a methodology for evaluating health insurance carrier and managed care organization plans with the goal of enhancing transparency and competition among insurance carriers to support consumers in making coverage decisions. Stakeholders including BOI, VDH, VHI, the Virginia Hospital & Healthcare Association, the Virginia Association of Health Plans, and the Medical Society of Virginia, among others, participated in the work of developing the methodology and identifying data sources for the dashboard.
- Register now for the fourth annual Regional Human Trafficking Summit hosted by the Regional
 Interdisciplinary Collaborative Working to Disrupt Human Trafficking (RIC), a multi-state nonprofit group that brings together academics, advocates, caregivers, clinicians, law enforcement,
 survivors, and other stakeholders who are working to end human trafficking. The theme of the
 Summit, which is scheduled for Feb. 7-8, 2024 at the VCU School of Medicine, is "Expanding
 Community Partnerships to Address Human Trafficking." Registration is available through this

- The **Centers for Disease Control and Prevention** (CDC) has updated <u>guidance</u> for the use of the monoclonal antibody nirsevimab to prevent severe respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) in young children due to an expected increase in supply from manufacturers.
- The Virginia Department of Medical Assistance Services (DMAS) has notified health care providers and managed care organizations (MCO) that as of Jan. 1 the agency is implementing 12-month continuous eligibility for children younger than 19 in Medicaid and Family Access to Medical Insurance Security (FAMIS), in accordance with a federal mandate that requires states to provide 12 months of continuous eligibility for children under age 19 in Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) (called FAMIS in Virginia), with limited exceptions. Continuous eligibility means the child remains enrolled for a protected 12-month period, during which their coverage cannot be reduced or terminated regardless of changes in circumstance. - The Virginia State Corporation Commission (SCC) has updated its website to provide resources for health care providers who submit complaints alleging insurer noncompliance with applicable laws and regulations. Under the Law, the SCC Bureau of Insurance (BOI) investigates all complaints and, following subsequent investigations, reports its findings and any resulting action to the complainants. The provider complaint procedures can be accessed online here under the "File Your Complaint/Appeal by Mail or Fax (Complaint Forms)" section.
- VHHA actively engages with the news media to share public messaging and coordinate member media appearances to showcase the important work done by Virginia hospitals. That includes recent coverage from <u>VPM</u>, <u>Cardinal News</u>, <u>WHSV</u>, the <u>Virginia Mercury</u>, <u>Blue Virginia</u>, and the <u>Virginia Star</u>.

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2. Take Action to Oppose Legislation Weakening Medical Malpractice Cap

VHHA is encouraging hospital team members to take action to urge legislators to reject a bill that would weaken Virginia's existing medical malpractice law. A bill pending in the **Virginia General Assembly** (Senate Bill 493) would remove the medical malpractice cap in cases involving patients 10 years old and younger. Under current law, the medical malpractice award cap is uniformly applied. This proposed law change represents a significant threat to health care access and affordability by potentially resulting in excessive damage awards that raise the cost of malpractice insurance to levels that could reduce the availability of providers offering specialty services, particularly in rural and underserved communities. VHHA supports the presence of a health care liability system that provides accountability and fair compensation in the rare instances when mistakes occur. 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4. Virginians See Rising Insurance Costs Despite State Health Care Spending Below National Average

When it comes to health care spending, Virginia is in the enviable position of having expenditure rates that remain well below national levels. The same cannot be said for health insurance costs, unfortunately. On the contrary, the amount that individuals and families across the Commonwealth spend on annual health insurance premiums and out-of-pocket deductibles continues to rise sharply year-over-year. Meanwhile, the gap between what individuals and families pay for insurance, and what insurance companies pay for health care services, continues to widen. Those findings are part of a new report from the non-partisan research firm Altarum that examines 2022 health spending in Virginia based on data from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), Virginia's All-Payer Claims Database, and other public sources. The Altarum analysis shows that the average single health insurance premium in 2022 was \$7,400 and the average family health insurance premium was \$21,400 for people with private sector employer-sponsored health care coverage. When the average cost of deductibles is included, the averages increase to "\$9,400 for single coverage and \$25,200 for family coverage." The report further notes that "premiums for single coverage of a private-sector employee are up 76.6 percent and family premiums are 79.3 percent higher" since 2008. When increases in cost-sharing copays and deductibles for single and family plans are factored in, total plans costs in 2022 were 89.1 percent higher over that span in both categories. Those increases have been a consistent trend, as a previous Altarum report on 2021 health care spending in Virginia similarly found significant growth in the total average cost of single and family health insurance premiums as well as growth in out-of-pocket costs. While insurance costs impacting Virginia families and employers are rising, growth in total health spending has been restrained: personal health care spending in the Commonwealth remains below national averages across several measures including total spending as a percent of state gross domestic product (GDP) and per capita health care spending. The Altarum report found that "Virginia's total health spending" as a percent of GDP "mainly stayed constant between 2015 and 2020 but has been declining in 2021 and 2022." In fact, the share of state GDP spent on health care declined from 15.8 percent in the fourth quarter of 2020 to 14.7 percent in the fourth quarter of 2022, reflecting an amount of spending in Virginia that "is the lowest since 2011 and well below the national average." 8. CDC Maternal Practices in Infant Nutrition Care Survey Available to Hospitals

The **Centers for Disease Control and Prevention** (CDC) 2024 Maternity Practices in Infant Nutrition and Care (mPINC) survey launched in January. The mPINC survey measures maternity care practices and policies and includes questions about infant nutrition. About every two years, CDC invites all hospitals with maternity services in the United States and territories to participate. Learn more about how CDC administers the mPINC survey here. 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9. FDA Revises Emergency Use Authorization for Paxlovid COVID Medication

The **U.S. Food and Drug Administration** (FDA) recently announced a revision to the emergency use authorization (EUA) indicating that Paxlovid manufactured and labeled in accordance with the EUA currently in U.S. distribution will remain authorized for use through the labeled or extended expiration date, as applicable, or through March 8, 2024, whichever is earlier. In December 2021, FDA authorized Paxlovid for emergency use for the treatment of adults and pediatric patients (12 years of age and older weighing at least 40 kg) who are at high risk for progression to severe COVID-19, including hospitalization or death. In May 2023, FDA approved Pfizer's new drug application (NDA) for Paxlovid for the treatment of mild-to-moderate COVID-19 in adults who are at high risk for progression to severe COVID-19, including hospitalization or death. EUA-labeled Paxlovid will no longer be authorized for emergency use after March 8, 2024, regardless of the labeled or extended expiration date. However, the Paxlovid EUA will continue to authorize emergency use of Paxlovid manufactured and labeled in accordance with the NDA (NDA-labeled Paxlovid) for the treatment of mild-to-moderate COVID-19 in pediatric patients (12 years of age and older weighing at least 40 kg) who are at high risk for progression to severe COVID-19, including hospitalization or death. This revision to the Paxlovid EUA is the next phase in the transition from the use of EUA-labeled Paxlovid to the use of NDA-labeled Paxlovid. Read more here.
