Senate Parliamentarian Rules on Reconciliation Plan, 16 House Republicans Oppose Senate Medicaid Cuts

The **U.S. Senate Parliamentarian** this week <u>advised</u> members of the **U.S. Senate** that several pieces of the budget reconciliation proposal pending in the chamber would be subject to a 60-vote threshold if they are part of the legislation. That includes a <u>provision</u> in the <u>U.S. Senate Finance Committee</u> budget reconciliation package which would change the hold harmless threshold for provider assessment health care-related taxes from 6 percent to 3.5. That proposed change, along with proposed changes to state directed payment programs (DPP), have significant revenue implications for hospitals. It is estimated those policy changes could cost Virginia hospitals more than \$2 billion annually. That funding loss could

lead to hospitals closing or reducing services. It would impact patient access to care and the economy. A separate analysis by the Commonwealth Fund projects nearly 500,000 health care jobs lost, including 13,200 in Virginia, in the next several years under the reconciliation plan. Virginia has a provider coverage assessment that is a tax on acute care hospitals to cover the state share of costs for the Medicaid expansion population. There is also a provider assessment for rate improvement. Hospital taxes from that mechanism help draw down federal funds to support Medicaid reimbursement rate improvement in the form of supplemental payments through DPP to bridge the financial gap for providers due to inadequate Medicaid reimbursement rates. The Senate has yet to act on its budget reconciliation plan. The U.S. House of Representatives previously approved its version of the reconciliation package that did not make major changes to the provider tax and DPP systems. This week, 16 House Republicans including U.S. Rep Jen Kiggans and U.S. Rep. Rob Wittman of Virginia signed a letter to GOP leaders in Congress opposing Medicaid cuts in the Senate reconciliation plan such as provider tax changes. During this critical time hospital team members and health care advocates are encouraged to contact their representatives in Congress to express their concerns about the impact decisions made during the reconciliation process could have on hospitals, patients, and the economy. HHS Announces Plan to Make Prior Authorization Process More Efficient, Transparent

The **U.S.** Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) recently announced it is pursuing efforts to "streamline and improve the prior authorization processes for Medicare Advantage, Medicaid Managed Care, Health Insurance Marketplace, and commercial plans covering nearly eight out of 10 Americans." The reform plan calls for electronic prior authorization requests to be standardized by 2027 and is said to complement ongoing regulatory efforts by the **Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services** (CMS) to improve prior authorization, including building upon the Interoperability and Prior Authorization final rule. The goal of this effort is to improve prior authorization efficiency and transparency.

VDH Seeks Survey Responses to Improve Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome Awareness

The Virginia Department of Health (VDH) is seeking survey responses to improve public health reporting and surveillance of Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome (NAS), which is a condition that affects newborns exposed to opioids or addictive substances in the womb, causing them to experience withdrawal symptoms during their first few days of life. By participating in this brief survey, clinicians will help identify key areas where additional support or resources are needed. This survey will provide valuable insights into the challenges and barriers faced when reporting NAS cases, helping VDH develop better educational tools to support health care providers across the state. All responses will be used for VDH's evaluation efforts and any data shared will be reported in aggregate to ensure privacy.
