#### VHHA Issues Call for 2026 Patient Safety Summit Poster Abstract Submissions

• Ahead of the 2026 Virginia Patient Safety Summit, VHHA invites staff from member hospitals and health systems to submit poster abstracts showcasing evidence-based quality and safety improvement projects. Submitted abstracts topics may include patient safety, quality improvement, and safety culture; care coordination, patient experience and patient-family engagement; population and community health; and workforce safety and well-being. Abstracts should be 400 words or less and should include tables, graphs, control charts, process maps, or key program drivers. Abstracts should contain data – those that don't will be excluded from consideration – and describe the problem, the intervention, results, and conclusions. The authors of selected abstracts will have the opportunity to record a video slide presentation with VHHA prior to the Summit and those videos will be shared on the online conference platform for attendees to view on-demand during the 2026 Patient Safety Summit, whose theme is "Safe Care, Every Step of the Way: Advancing a Culture of Safety in Healthcare." # **News Updates**

## President Trump Announces Drug Pricing Deals with AstraZeneca and Leading IVF Maker

U.S. President Donald Trump recently announced deals with pharmaceutical maker AstraZeneca to provide state Medicaid programs with most-favored-nation (MNF) pricing and discounted prices when selling medication directly to American patients, and EMD Serono, a leading maker of in vitro fertilization fertility treatments to provide MFN pricing to American women. This follows a previous announcement from Pfizer on an agreement with the White House on most-favored-nation pricing. The Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers of American (PhRMA) also announced new domestic infrastructure investment, financial assistance supports for patients, and a new website to connect patients with manufacturer direct purchase programs. The President previously warned drug makers in a social media post that his Administration would impose significant tariffs on those that didn't pledge to build pharmaceutical manufacturing capacity in the U.S. In a separate executive order, the President declared that "Americans should not be forced to subsidize low-cost prescription drugs and biologics in other developed countries, and face overcharges for the same products in the United States." The order directed the U.S. Secretary of Commerce to engage with pharmaceutical makers "to bring prices for American patients in line with comparably developed nations" through regulatory action "to impose most-favored-nation pricing." It also directed the U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services to "facilitate direct-to-consumer purchasing programs for pharmaceutical manufacturers that sell their products to American patients at the most-favored-nation price."

## Federal Government Shutdown Impacts Virginia-Based Organ Donation Network

The leader of the Richmond-based **United Network for Organ Sharing** (UNOS) recently <u>shared</u> that the organization has been directed by the federal government "to pause much of its critically important OPTN (**Organ Procurement and Transplantation Network**) work." Last year, the **Health Resources and Services Administration** (HRSA) at the **U.S. Department of Health and Human Services** (HHS) <u>announced</u> a series of multi-vendor contract awards to modernize the nation's organ transplant system. In a social media post, UNOS CEO **Maureen McBride** said the federal government is using the shutdown "to indefinitely pause work that upholds the day-to-day operation of the OPTN" which "directly impacts the safety of the system and delays improvements for patients." The post also claims that the government "has made virtually no progress toward transitioning the work of the OPTN to multiple vendors" and that the "organ donation and transplant system is headed toward extreme operational challenges after December 29, when the current contract for UNOS to manage the majority of the OPTN operations expires." Meanwhile, recent news reports <u>indicate</u> UNOS has furloughed 90 employees amid the shutdown. At this point, more than two weeks have passed since the partial government shutdown took effect Oct. 1 after Congress was unable to agree on a temporary plan to fund government functions by the start of the current federal fiscal year. As the shutdown began, the **U.S. Department of Health** 

and Human Services (HHS) shared a <u>contingency plan</u> explaining that it would continue "any exempt or excepted activities in the event of a lapse in appropriation" including the **Administration for Strategic Preparedness and Response** (ASPR) maintaining minimal readiness for all hazards, the **National Institutes of Health** (NIH) continuing research and clinical activities necessary to protect human life and government property, the **Food and Drug Administration** (FDA) continuing activities to support drug and medical device reviews, and the **Centers for Disease Control and Prevention** (CDC) continuing to monitor for disease outbreaks. The HHS plan also indicates staff will be available "as necessary to support mandatory funded activities" such as Medicare and Medicaid.

#### Governor Youngkin Proclamations Honor Healthcare Security Officers, CHWs, Midwifes, Pharmacists

This month, **Virginia Governor Glenn Youngkin** issued several proclamations honoring health care professionals and raising health issue awareness. Among the proclamations are those recognizing <u>Virginia Pharmacists Month</u>, <u>Chiropractic Health Month</u>, <u>Liver Disease Awareness Month</u>, <u>Long-Term Care Residents Month</u>, <u>Spine Health Awareness Month</u>, <u>Dysautonomia Awareness Month</u>, <u>Breast Cancer Awareness Month</u>, <u>Virginia Midwifery Week</u>, <u>PANS/PANDAS Awareness Day</u>, <u>Healthcare Security and Safety Officer Week</u>, <u>Infection Prevention Week</u>, <u>Respiratory Care Week</u>, and First Responders Day.

#### CDC Data Shows 2025 Measles Cases Now Documented in 41 States

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), 1,596 confirmed measles cases have been reported ] in the U.S. in 2025, with the majority of those in 42 jurisdictions: Alaska, Arkansas, Arizona, California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York City, New York state, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Vermont, Virginia, Washington, Wisconsin, and Wyoming. There have been 44 outbreaks reported in 2025 and 86 percent of confirmed cases (1,380 of 1,596) are outbreak-associated. For comparison, 16 outbreaks were reported during 2024 and 69 percent of cases (198 of 285) were outbreak-associated. The Center for Outbreak Response Innovation at John Hopkins University indicates the current measles case count is the highest U.S. number since 1992. View a North American data dashboard on 2025 measles cases here. Measles is a highly contagious illness that can spread by airborne means. Its symptoms usually appear in two stages: first, an infected person may develop a fever of greater than 101 degrees and experience a runny nose, watery red eyes, and a cough from 7-14 days after being exposed; second is the appearance of a skin rash that can start 3-5 days after symptoms begin. People with measles are contagious from four days before the rash appears through four days after the rash appears. There have been four confirmed measles cases in Virginia this year.

## Medicare Annual Enrollment Period Active Through Dec. 7

The Medicare open enrollment period for 2026 began this week and continues through Dec. 7. During this period, eligible individuals can enroll or disenroll from Medicare Advantage plans, change drug plans, and more. Earlier this year, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) indicated that it anticipates premium and drug plan cost stability for 2026 coverage. In 2025, CMS data shows that of the 69 million Americans enrolled in Medicare Parts A and B, about 51 percent were in Medicare Advantage plans. 
