Deadline Approaching for Hospitals to Apply for State Breastfeeding Designation Program

Nov. 1 is the deadline to submit an application for the **Virginia Maternity Center Breastfeeding-Friendly Designation Program**. The Virginia Maternity Center Breastfeeding-Friendly Designation Program is the state designation program based on Baby-Friendly USA's Ten Steps to Successful Breastfeeding. These steps help birthing facilities review and celebrate actions being taken to promote breastfeeding for the families they serve. The program asks participating hospitals to submit data related to the Ten Steps. Participation in the program is voluntary – there is no cost associated with applying or earning a

Breastfeeding-Friendly designation and no site visits are required. The application process is virtual. Visit this <u>link</u> for more information about the program, including the application process.

HHS OIG Finds Medicare Advantage, Medicaid Plans Have Limited Behavioral Health Options

A recent <u>report</u> from the **U.S. House and Human Services** (HHS) **Office of Inspector General** (OIG) concludes that many Medicare Advantage and Medicaid managed care plans have limited behavioral health provider networks and inactive providers who don't provide services to enrollees. The report recommends the use of data to monitor provider networks, efforts to improve network directory accuracy, and exploration of how a national directory might reduce inaccuracies and increase efficiency for patients and providers. A <u>separate analysis by KFF</u> found that Medicare advantage enrollees "were in a plan that included just under half (48%) of all physicians available to traditional Medicare beneficiaries in their area in 2022, on average."

KFF Health Benefits Survey Shows 6 Percent Increase in Annual Family Premiums for Employer Plans

A recent KFF analysis shows that annual premiums for employer-provided family health coverage have increased 6 percent from 2024, reaching \$26,993. The analysis found that on average, workers contributed \$6,850 towards the cost of coverage and that the average deductible was \$1,886 for single coverage. The KFF analysis is based on results from the 27th annual Employer Health Benefits Survey. Read more here. A separate annual assessment of Virginia health insurance costs has likewise shown that Virginia families and individuals have endured double-digit percentage increases in health insurance premium costs in recent years, with annual private health insurance premiums in Virginia increasing 20.2 percent for single individuals and 22.1 percent for families from 2019-2023.

FDA Draft Guidance Proposes Updates to Accelerate Biosimilar Development

This week, the **U.S. Food and Drug Administration** (FDA) <u>announced</u> efforts to accelerate the development and lower the costs for developing biosimilar medicines. That includes new <u>draft guidance</u> from FDA that proposed updates to simplify biosimilarity studies and reduce unnecessary clinical testing. The FDA is also pursuing efforts to make it easier for biosimilars to be developed as interchangeable with brand-name biologics to help patients and pharmacists with access to lower-cost options.

ACA Marketplace Health Plan Open Enrollment for 2026 Coverage Set to Begin Nov. 1

The <u>open enrollment period</u> for people to purchase 2026 health coverage plans on the Affordable Care Act (ACA) health insurance marketplace begins Saturday, Nov. 1, 2025 and continues until Jan. 15, 2026. In 2025, nearly 389,000 Virginians enrolled in coverage through <u>Virginia's Insurance Marketplace</u>. What is different about this cycle is that the enrollment period is two weeks shorter than last year and fewer people may have access to financial support that helps subsidize the cost of purchasing coverage. For the past several years, enhanced premium tax credits (EPTC) approved by Congress have helped qualified individuals purchase coverage on the marketplace. Those EPTCs are set to expire at the end of this year if Congress doesn't extend them. Anticipating EPTC expiration, health insurance companies that offer marketplace plans have proposed rate increases for plan year 2026 in Virginia and beyond. In August, the **Virginia State Corporation Commission** (SCC) <u>announced</u> that many health insurers offering individual and small group coverage marketplace plans have requested rate increases, with many proposing average increases of 20 percent or more. It has been projected that as many as one-fourth of the Virginians who now have marketplace plans could lose coverage if the enhanced premium tax

credits expire. Nationally, an <u>analysis</u> by Peterson-KFF showed that "across 312 insurers participating in the ACA Marketplaces from the 50 states and the District of Columbia" there is "a median proposed premium increase of 18 percent." The study indicates that is a sharp increase from last year and "the largest rate change insurers have requested since 2018." The SCC also noted that insurers requested an average 11.2 percent rate increase for small group rates in 2026. A debate between Democrats and Republicans in Congress over EPTC extension is one of the issues that remains in contention as part of the ongoing federal government shutdown that began Oct. 1.

Medicare Annual Enrollment Period Active Through Dec. 7

The <u>Medicare open enrollment period</u> for 2026 recently began and continues through Dec. 7. During this period, eligible individuals can enroll or disenroll from Medicare Advantage plans, change drug plans, and more. Earlier this year, the **Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services** (CMS) <u>indicated</u> that it anticipates premium and drug plan cost stability for 2026 coverage. In 2025, <u>CMS data</u> shows that of the 69 million Americans enrolled in Medicare Parts A and B, about 51 percent were in Medicare Advantage plans.
