Virginia Continues its Streak as a Top State for Hospital Patient Safety in National Ranking

Virginia hospitals have once again earned national accolades for excellence in patient safety and
care in the form of recent news that the Commonwealth is <u>ranked second overall among states</u>
in the Fall 2025 Leapfrog Group Hospital Safety Grade rankings. Hospitals in Virginia have
consistently been top performers in the bi-annual rankings of acute care hospitals. For the Fall

2025 period, 53.5 percent of Virginia hospitals evaluated by the Leapfrog Group received an "A" grade. Virginia previously ranked <u>fifth overall in the Spring 2025 rankings</u> and second in the <u>Fall 2024</u>, <u>Spring 2024</u>, <u>Fall 2023</u>, <u>Fall 2022</u>, and the <u>Spring 2022</u> periods. The Commonwealth was <u>first overall in the Fall 2021 rankings</u>, fourth in Spring 2021, sixth in Fall 2020, third in Fall 2019, second in Spring 2019, third in Fall 2018, and fifth in Spring 2018. Hospitals from **Bon Secours**, **Carilion Clinic**, **Centra**, **HCA Virginia**, **Inova**, **Lifepoint Health**, **Riverside**, **Sentara Health**, **UVA Health**, **Valley Health**, and **VCU Health** are among those receiving "A" grades. News Updates

Congress, White House Reach Deal to End Five-Week Federal Government Shutdown

Members of **Congress** and **U.S. President Donald J. Trump** this week reached agreement on a deal to end the federal government shutdown that began Oct. 1 and has endured more than five weeks. The logiam on the longest federal government shutdown in history was broken when eight members of the Senate Democratic Caucus agreed to vote with Republicans in the **U.S. Senate** on a plan to restore government funding for a range of programs including federal food aid for needy families and provide backpay for furloughed federal workers. The short-term funding deal to re-open the government, which

also attracted support from the GOP majority in the **U.S. House of Representatives** and the **White House**, runs through Jan. 30, 2026. It does not unwind Medicaid policy and funding changes in the One Big Beautiful Bill Act. Health care funding and policy, including a debate over extending expiring enhanced premium tax credits to help individuals purchase ACA marketplace insurance plans, were a sticking point in the talks over ending the shutdown and funding the government. As part of the compromise to end the shutdown, Democrats received a commitment from Senate GOP leadership for a future vote on health care legislation. **U.S. Senator Tim Kaine** (D) of Virginia was among the group of eight senators who joined with Republicans to advance legislation to end the shutdown.

CMS Announces New Voluntary Drug Payment Model for State Medicaid Agencies, Pharmaceuticals

The **Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services** (CMS) recently announced a new GENErating cost Reductions for U.S. (GENEROUS) Medicaid Model pilot program to enable state Medicaid programs to purchase drugs included in the pilot at prices aligned with those paid in select other countries, allowing Americans to benefit from fairer, more competitive pricing. CMS has released a <u>request for applications</u> (RFA) for drug manufacturers interested in participating in the GENEROUS Model. The agency will also seek letters of intent from state Medicaid agencies interested in participating. States that express interest will later have the opportunity to formally apply and potentially opt in to the terms and prices CMS negotiates with participating drug manufacturers whose applications are accepted. CDC Data: 2025 Confirmed Measles Cases Exceed 1,700 Across the Nation

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), 1,723 confirmed measles cases have been reported in the U.S. in 2025, with the majority of those in 43 jurisdictions: Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, Arizona, California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York City, New York state, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Vermont, Virginia, Washington, Wisconsin, and Wyoming. There have been 45 outbreaks reported in 2025 and 87 percent of confirmed cases (1,503 of 1,723) are outbreak-associated. For comparison, 16 outbreaks were reported during 2024 and 69 percent of cases (198 of 285) were outbreak-associated. The Center for Outbreak Response Innovation at John Hopkins University indicates the current measles case count is the highest U.S. number since 1992. View a North American data dashboard on 2025 measles cases here. Measles is a highly contagious illness that can spread by airborne means. Its symptoms usually appear in two stages: first, an infected person may develop a fever of greater than 101 degrees and experience a runny nose, watery red eyes, and a cough from 7-14 days after being exposed; second is the appearance of a skin rash that can start 3-5 days after symptoms begin. People with measles are contagious from four days before the rash appears through four days after the rash appears. There have been four confirmed measles cases in Virginia this year.

ACA Marketplace Health Plan Enrollment Period for 2026 Coverage Open to the Public

The <u>open enrollment period</u> for people to purchase 2026 health coverage plans on the Affordable Care Act (ACA) health insurance marketplace is open until Jan. 15, 2026. In 2025, nearly 389,000 Virginians enrolled in coverage through <u>Virginia's Insurance Marketplace</u>. What is different about this cycle is that the enrollment period is two weeks shorter than last year and fewer people may have access to financial support that helps subsidize the cost of purchasing coverage. For the past several years, enhanced

premium tax credits (EPTC) approved by Congress have helped qualified individuals purchase coverage on the marketplace. Those EPTCs are set to expire at the end of this year if Congress doesn't extend them. Anticipating EPTC expiration, health insurance companies that offer marketplace plans have proposed rate increases for plan year 2026 in Virginia and beyond. In August, the Virginia State Corporation Commission (SCC) announced that many health insurers offering individual and small group coverage marketplace plans have requested rate increases, with many proposing average increases of 20 percent or more. It has been projected that as many as one-fourth of the Virginians who now have marketplace plans could lose coverage if the enhanced premium tax credits expire. Nationally, an analysis by Peterson-KFF showed that "across 312 insurers participating in the ACA Marketplaces from the 50 states and the District of Columbia" there is "a median proposed premium increase of 18 percent." The study indicates that is a sharp increase from last year and "the largest rate change insurers have requested since 2018." The SCC also noted that insurers requested an average 11.2 percent rate increase for small group rates in 2026.

Medicare Annual Enrollment Period Active Through Dec. 7

The Medicare open enrollment period for 2026 recently began and continues through Dec. 7. During this period, eligible individuals can enroll or disenroll from Medicare Advantage plans, change drug plans, and more. Earlier this year, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) indicated that it anticipates premium and drug plan cost stability for 2026 coverage. In 2025, CMS data shows that of the 69 million Americans enrolled in Medicare Parts A and B, about 51 percent were in Medicare Advantage plans.
