News Updates

CDC Advisory Panel Recommends Individual Choice on Hepatitis B Vaccine for Infants

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recently voted to recommend "individual-based decision-making" as parents evaluate whether to have a hepatitis B vaccine dose administered to infants born to women who test negative for the virus. For infants with parents who opt not to accept the birth dose, ACIP recommends that the initial dose be administered no earlier than two months of age. ACIP did not update CDC recommendations regarding vaccination for infants born to women who test positive for the virus or those with an unknown virus status. In a separate statement, the American Academy of Pediatrics said the decision will "harm children," adding that it "continues to recommend giving newborns a dose of hepatitis B vaccine within 24 hours of birth with additional doses at 1-2 months and 6-18 months."

Federal Medicare Payment Advisory Commission Shares 2027 Rate Recommendations

Discussion of draft Medicare payment rate updates for 2027 were a topic of discussion during a <u>recent</u> <u>meeting</u> of the federal **Medicare Payment Advisory Commission** (MedPAC). The draft recommendations call on Congress to update Medicare rates for hospital inpatient and outpatient services and transition to a safety-net index policy to distribute an additional \$1 billion to safety-net hospitals. The recommendations further urge Congress to update 2027 Medicare base payments for physicians and other health professional services, and to reduce the 2027 payment rate for inpatient rehabilitation facilities, home health agencies, and skilled nursing facilities. A vote on the recommendations is expected in January.

CMS Provides Guidance to States on Community Engagement, Work Rules for Adults on Medicaid

This week, the **Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services** (CMS) shared <u>guidance</u> with states regarding new community engagement and work standards for adult Medicaid participants established under the budget reconciliation legislation approved earlier this year. Under the provisions of the law, able bodied adults on Medicaid will be required to work, be in school, or provide community service totaling at least 80 hours a month as a condition of program participation. Medicaid enrollees must also meet income guidelines, among other eligibility standards. States are directed to implement the community engagement requirements by Jan. 1, 2027. Read more here.

HHS Modifies Nursing Home Minimum Staffing Standard Rule

The **U.S. Department of Health and Human Services** (HHS) recently <u>announced</u> the repeal of certain provisions of a federal rule on Minimum Staffing Standards for Long-Term Care Facilities. A <u>2024 rule</u> from the Biden Administration established a requirement that nursing homes participating in Medicare and Medicaid provide residents with a minimum total of 3.48 hours of nursing care per day. That included at least 0.55 hours from a registered nurse per resident per day, 2.45 hours from a nurse aide per resident per day, and requirements that each facility have a registered nurse onsite round-the-clock. The Trump Administration is repealing those provisions on the grounds that they "disproportionately burdened facilities, especially those serving rural and Tribal communities, and jeopardized patient's access to care."

Right to Work Repeal Legislation Pre-Filed Ahead of 2026 Virginia General Assembly Session

State **Senator Jennifer Carroll Foy** (D-Prince William County) has pre-filed <u>legislation</u> seeking to repeal Virginia's longstanding <u>right to work law</u> that prohibits compulsory union membership as a condition of employment. The legislation, Senate Bill 32, has been <u>referred</u> to the **Senate Commerce and Labor Committee** and will be pending there when the 2026 **Virginia General Assembly** session commences on Jan. 14. Repealing Virginia's right to work law has long been a goal for organized labor groups. It is opposed by business groups, including the <u>Keep Virginia Working</u> coalition that is encouraging Virginians to contact state lawmakers to express opposition to the legislation on the grounds that repeal would harm individual freedom and undermine economic competitiveness in the Commonwealth. During the 2025 gubernatorial campaign, **Governor-elect Abigail Spanberger** <u>reportedly said</u> she did not support full repeal of the right to work law, while indicating that reforms to that policy may be appropriate in the future.

Save the Date: 2026 Virginia Patient Safety Summit

Save the date for the **2026 Virginia Patient Safety Summit**, which will be held as a virtual event on Feb. 26, 2026. The Summit will highlight innovative work in Virginia and across the nation to advance a culture of safety and continuous improvement in health care with a focus on how shared values and behaviors can minimize errors, improve outcomes, and enhance the overall quality and experience of care. Beginning in 2026, the **Centers for Medicare &Medicaid Services** (CMS) will require all U.S. hospitals participating in Medicare or Medicaid to attest to patient safety structural measures that assess strategies to strengthen systems for safety, including leadership commitment to eliminating preventable harm, supporting a culture of safety and learning health systems, accountability and transparency, and patient and family engagement. The **VHHA Center for Healthcare Excellence** is hosting this event in partnership with the **Virginia Nurses Foundation**, the **Medical Society of Virginia**, the **Virginia Pharmacists Association**, and the **Virginia Society of Health-System Pharmacists**.
